About our Partnership:

When the partnership was formed back in 2005, DCPC proposed that we focus on preschool education and on encouraging older children to stay in school and finish high school.

Since then, DCPC has provided funds to help build several preschools and has annually provided scholarships that enable parents to allow their children to remain in school. Currently we are providing



scholarships for 59 students in K-12 or university. The funds are used to provide food for families, provide school uniforms, shoes, backpacks, and supplies, and to provide a stipend for some university students to help them with food and transportation costs.

Regular trips allow DCPC members to build relationships and show our love, respect and support for our Christian siblings.

Disaster Relief

The devastating hurricanes in 2020 destroyed highways, bridges and schools, 70% of the production of beans, and 10% of the production of rice were lost to the rain, along with many other vegetables. Thanks to the generosity of our congregation, DCPC was able to contribute to CEPAD's relief campaign to help—from buying zinc roof sheets, nails and water purifying systems to training 15 pastors and community leaders to accompany 140 families from the Kilambe communities that experienced terrifying landslides, providing them psycho-social and pastoral care in 3 hour meetings twice a month.



More repairs and construction remains to be done to help these communities fully recover from the loss.

We wish to work for justice, peace, humanitarian relief, and reconciliation as called for by the Gospel. New Preschool Underway

DCPC members returned to Kilambe after a four-year break due to political transitions and COVID.

After visiting CEPAD and Jubilee House in Managua, the team traveled to the mountains, where they helped begin construction on a new one-room **preschool** in Los Cocos, a new community established by people who had lost their homes in the hurricanes. The kids for the preschool were already meeting in the home of their teacher and they were in their new school by fall. Critical funds from DCPC helped buy the building materials needed.

This was one of the most physically demanding trips in our 18 year history of visiting the region. But those who went shared their enthusiasm and gratitude for getting to work alongside the amazing and resilient people. They also met many of the students who receive scholarships from DCPC—from preschool to university.

Global partners help us see the world and God's glory in unique and meaningful ways.

Over 60 DCPC youth and adults have experienced the meaningful and impactful trip to Nicaragua over the course of our partnership.
